Main cable carrying 90.9 Amperes, comprised of 19/13 wires, each .072 B.Y.S. S.W.G. diameter, .0773 square inches total sectional area
 Branch cables carrying 35 Amperes, comprised of 7/14 wires, each .069 B.Y.S. S.W.G. diameter, .0229 square inches total sectional area
 Branch cables carrying 16.8 Amperes, comprised of 7/20 wires, each .032 B.Y.S. S.W.G. diameter, .0056 square inches total sectional area
 Leads to lamps carrying .5 Amperes, comprised of 7/22 wires, each .025 B.Y.S. S.W.G. diameter, .0035 square inches total sectional area
 Cargo light cables carrying 1.8 Amperes, comprised of 7/22 wires, each .025 B.Y.S. S.W.G. diameter, .0035 square inches total sectional area

Lead & Armored Cable Throughout

Joints in cables, how made, insulated, and protected Good Mechanical Joints, Soldered, Taped & Painted With Insulating Compound

How are the lamps specially protected in places liable to the accumulation of vapour or gas Vapor Proof Lamps

The copper used is guaranteed to have a conductivity of not less than that of the Engineering Standards Committee's standard, and the wires are protected by tinning from the sulphur compounds present in the insulating material.

Insulation of cables is guaranteed to have a resistance of not less than 500 megohms per statute mile at 60° Fahrenheit after 24 hours' immersion in water, the test being made after one minute's electrification at not less than 500 volts and while the cable is still immersed.

The foregoing statements are a correct description of the Electric Light installation fitted by us on this vessel and we declare that it is at this date in good order and safe working condition.
