The survivors jumped into the water after the explosion and most of them reached rafts, from which they were picked up about three hours later by a British vessel.

Injured Men Saved By Rafts

Survivors of the Norwegian vessel Sig (1,342 tons), also sunk by an explosion, have been landed at an East Coast port. It is feared that others were drowned. Some of the survivors were injured.

The men jumped into the sea after the explosion and swam to rafts, from which they were taken three hours later by an English ship.

NORWEGIAN STEAMER "SIG"

Survivors of the Norwegian vessel Sig, of 1342 tons gross, have been landed at an East Coast United Kingdom port following an explosion. It is believed that others have been drowned. Some of the survivors with minor injuries were taken to hospital. Most of the rescued men were scantily clad. They had jumped into the water after the explosion and most of them managed to reach rafts, from which they were picked up about three hours later by an English vessel.

The Sig was acquired by A/S. D/S. Ask (Mr. A. Kjerland), of Bergen, in 1937. She was formerly the Seabank and Joyce Llewellyn, having been built in 1924 by J. Lewis & Sons, Ltd., Aberdeen.
